




By the late 1800s, the United States extended across North America from the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific Ocean.






In the 1840s, wagon trains headed to Oregon across the prairie on the Oregon Trail.






In 1807, Robert Fulton introduced the first passenger steamboat. By 1840, more than two hundred steamboats regularly traveled the Mississippi River; by 1860, there were more than a thousand.





In 1869, the transcontinental railroad was completed.





The 1848 discovery of gold in California led to more westward migration.






The 1862 Homestead Act gave land to people who agreed to settle in the West.






During the late 1700s and early 1800s, many Native Americans who lived north of the Ohio River had lost their lands or migrated.





In 1830, the U.S. government passed the Indian Removal Act.





In the 1830s, the forced migration of the Cherokee, other Southeast Indians, and other groups north of the Ohio River to Indian Territory began.






In 1876, the Lakota Sioux and Cheyenne defeated Custer's army at Little Bighorn.
