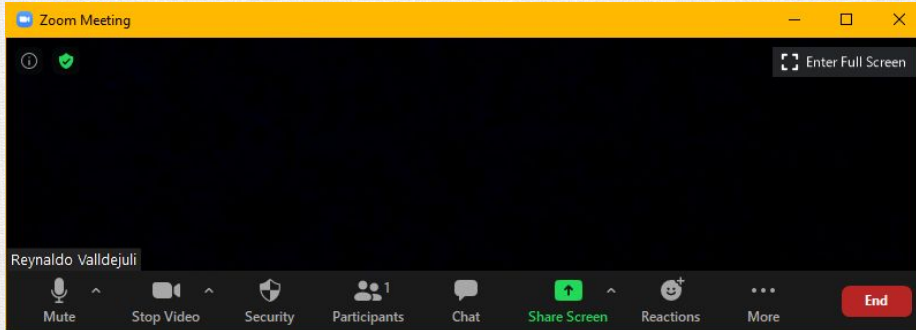

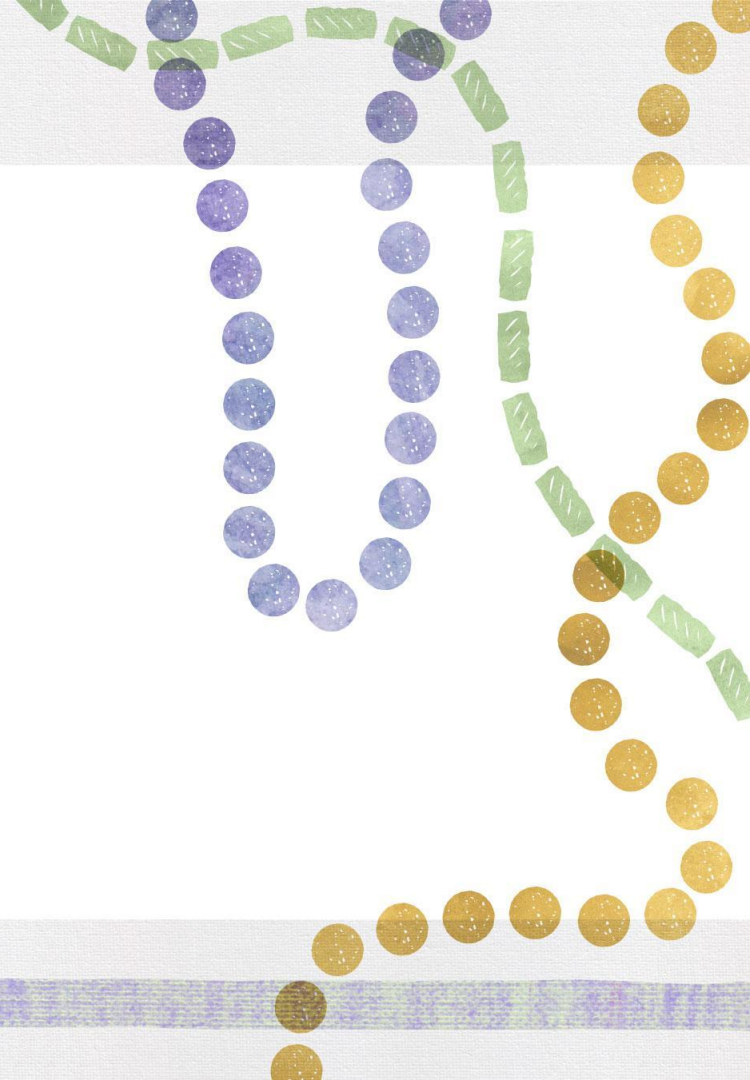
Summer 2023 Guidance Overview

The Department has developed summer resources through our [literacy](#) and [Accelerate ELA](#) initiatives. These resources were created to:

- maximize the the effectiveness of summer instruction; and
- provide guidance to systems and families so they can best meet the needs of their students.



Literacy Summer Guidance



3rd and 4th Grade Summer Literacy Intervention Guidance

Bulletin 1566 requires that third and fourth-grade students who score below grade level on an end-of-year literacy assessment must receive 30 hours of summer literacy interventions consisting of explicit, targeted literacy instruction based on the science of reading or they will be retained.

Grade 3 Student Eligibility

All third-grade students should be administered a literacy screener to determine eligibility for summer intervention.

School systems should use one of the following options:

- Acadience Reading (formerly DIBELS Next): Maze
- DIBELS 8th: Maze
- STEEP: Advanced Literacy
- STEP: Reading Comprehension: Administer STEP 12
- Oral reading fluency (ORF) passage, “Quest for the Best,” from the Literacy Interventions and Foundational Tools (LIFT) Kit

Grade 4 Student Eligibility

Any fourth-grade student who scored Mastery or Advanced on the ELA LEAP 2025 in third grade or scores on or above grade level on the MOY literacy screening is exempt from this policy. This is also applicable to students repeating grade 4.

To determine eligibility for summer intervention, school systems should use one of the following options. Literacy screening results will not be reported to the LDOE.

- Acadience Reading (formerly DIBELS Next): Maze
- DIBELS 8th: Maze
- STEEP: Advanced Literacy
- STEP: Reading Comprehension: Administer STEP 12
- Oral reading fluency (ORF) passage, “Quest for the Best,” from the Literacy Interventions and Foundational Tools (LIFT) Kit

Summer Literacy Instruction Structure

School systems may use existing summer learning programs and structures that provide literacy instruction based on the science of reading. Below is a sample of a literacy block.

Literacy Block - 2 hours, 15 days	
Time	Structure
20 minutes	FIRE lessons - use upcoming grade level - whole group
30 minutes	Small group instruction (no more than 5 kids in a group) - using LIFT materials or other HQIM literacy intervention materials Group 1 - 15 minutes while others work independently Group 2 - 15 minutes while others work independently
40 minutes	Whole group foundational skills lessons
30 minutes	Small group instruction (no more than 5 kids in a group) - using LIFT materials or other HQIM literacy intervention materials Group 1 - 15 minutes while others work independently Group 2 - 15 minutes while others work independently

Student Retention

A student qualifying for summer literacy intervention who fails to participate in the program but scores Basic or higher on the current year Spring ELA LEAP 2025 assessment may be promoted to the next grade level.

Prior to retaining a student, a meeting of the SBLC committee may be called by the school or parent to determine whether retention or another option for additional student support is in the best interest of the student.

Accelerate

Accelerate is an **equal-access**, just-in-time tutoring model that is focused on identifying, celebrating, and building upon the assets students bring to the learning experience.

An acceleration approach addresses unfinished learning in an equitable way.

Acceleration means connecting unfinished learning in the **context** of new learning, integrating new information and the needed prior knowledge.

Accelerate ELA Resources

ACCELERATION IS


- ✓ Achieved through tutoring, or extra time, that supports students in building the knowledge and skills required to be successful in core instruction within the context of a high-quality curriculum.
- ✓ A type of intervention.
- ✓ Proactive, deliberate action planning.
- ✓ Targeted and individualized for students based on their specific needs as gathered from diagnostic and formative data collected as students engage in the work of the curriculum.

ACCELERATION IS NOT

- ✗ Speeding up teaching or compressing content.
- ✗ Teaching skills in isolation from current, grade-level learning.
- ✗ Grade retention or skipping.
- ✗ A substitution for more intensive interventions students might also need.
- ✗ Computer programs, workbooks, or test preparation.
- ✗ Boot camp or reteaching of previous grade skills at the beginning of the school year.
- ✗ Utilizing resources or programs that are disconnected from the high-quality curriculum.
- ✗ Determined only through standards-based assessing and reporting absent of high-quality curriculum embedded assessments.
- ✗ Grouping students by perceived ability.

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Accelerate ELA K-2 Foundational Skills

The K-2 foundational skill lessons include the following:

- twenty lessons for each grade level that follow a consistent and intentional pattern;
- warm-up activities that consists of phonological awareness or letter sound reviews; and
- a focus on past sounds so teachers can provide students with just in time supports.



Accelerate ELA Tutoring Resources Guidance for Kindergarten through Second Grade

What is Accelerate?
Accelerate is designed to support school systems implementing tutoring at scale as a core function in order to achieve significant results for all students.


To effectively address and prevent unfinished learning, students must be provided with extra time to learn through equal-access tutoring. Accelerate is a just-in-time tutoring model that is focused on identifying, celebrating, and building upon the assets students bring to the learning experience. An acceleration approach addresses unfinished learning in an equitable way. Acceleration means connecting unfinished learning in the context of new learning, integrating new information and the needed prior knowledge.

To accelerate mastery of ELA standards by K-2 students, teachers must continue to use high-quality curricula to focus on reading, understanding, and expressing understanding of text.

How do Foundational Skills accelerate learning?
Foundational skills are necessary and central components of an effective, comprehensive reading program designed to develop proficient readers with the capacity to comprehend texts across a range of types and disciplines. Therefore, in order to address unfinished learning, teachers should support students in concepts of print, phonological awareness, phonics, vocabulary development, syntax, and fluency in a logical and transparent progression.

Foundational Skills Tutoring Resources Overview by Grade Level	
Lessons contain phonological awareness, phonics, fluency, and comprehension.	
Kindergarten	45 lessons, 30 minutes
1st Grade	45 lessons, 30 minutes
2nd Grade	40 lessons, 30 minutes

How are the Foundational Skills Lessons structured?
Every lesson begins with a Warm-Up activity that consists of phonological awareness or letter sound reviews. These warm-ups spiral in past sounds so that teachers are able to make connections to new learning about to occur. Lessons may contain explicit sound instruction with targeted chaining and dictation in which tutors can receive real-time instructional data. Some additional lesson components will progress into fluency passages, sound sorts, comprehension and writing through guided practice, partner work, and independent work. There are opportunities for tutors to differentiate portions of the lesson based on student need through identifying reading words, phrases, sentences and passage fluency.



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Accelerate ELA Materials in Grades 3-10

Each Accelerate Tutoring text is found on [CommonLit](#) and has seven lessons built around close reading best practices. Lessons 3-7 engage students in multiple readings and activities for the same text or portions of the same text over multiple lessons.

For each reading, students process through a different reading lens, aligned to grade-level standards, in order to understand the meaning of the text.

This text also teaches students the importance of practice to get it right as they get ready to write their narrative, and understand the importance of everyone being able to access books.
