SUBJECT: Archery, Hunter Safety Programs, and Gun Safety Classes

A recent United States Department of Education (ED) interpretation<sup>1</sup> of the Bipartisan Safer Communities Act (BSCA) has created concern and confusion regarding the use of funds for "training in the use of a dangerous weapons." Unfortunately, ED's erroneous position is that school archery programs, hunter safety programs, gun safety classes, and other programs, such as wilderness safety courses, may not be funded with various federal dollars<sup>2</sup>.

After conversations with multiple Congressional offices, I am advising that you continue funding these relevant programs, if so desired within your system. These endeavors have a rich history within the State of Louisiana and provide positive outlets for many students.

My office will advocate for the continuation of these programs for Louisiana school systems that choose to provide these opportunities for students. As this matter progresses, I will provide you with the necessary updates. In the meantime, please confer with your system's legal counsel as appropriate.
