

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Louisiana Center for Safe School

Develop a comprehensive planning/training model that will ensure all stakeholders can adopt and or integrate in their current school safety plans.

- 1) Prepare school systems to respond to and recover from emergencies and disasters at the individual, local, and state levels.
- 2) Increase intelligence, information sharing, and situational awareness capabilities.
- 3) Document, assess, and facilitate the enhancement of protective measures for schools to reduce vulnerability.
- 4) Participate in specific exercises, drills, meetings, workshops, and trainings on emergency preparedness coordination.

EOPs: Planning, Drills, and Exercises

OND

- a. Develop & regularly update a comprehensive crisis or emergency operation plan addressing all hazards.
- b. Conduct regular safety drills, including lockdown drills, to familiarize students and staff with emergency procedures.
- c. Regularly assess and address physical vulnerabilities, such as broken locks inadequate lighting, or areas of the school that are difficult to monitor.
- d. Establish a clear protocol for responding to threats or incidents including a designated crisis team and communication channels
- e. Continuously evaluate and assess the effectiveness of school safety measures and adapt them as needed to address emerging threats or vulnerabilities.



Coordinate with First Responders & School-Based Law Enforcement

OND

- a. Establish strong relationships with local law enforcement, first responders, and support services; whole community stakeholder engagement
- b. Develop local/district threat assessment teams & allow the subject matter experts to assist in planning, training, and exercising the plan
- c. Establish a clear protocol for responding to threats or incidents, including designated crisis teams and specific communication channels.
- d. Conduct regular safety drills with the necessary responders to familiarize and drill the appropriate emergency procedures.
- e. Encourage regular presence; patrols, safety days, community events, CTE talks or job fairs, etc.



Physical Security and Safety Screening

POND

- a. Conduct thorough background checks on all school staff members.
- b. Implement a visitor management system that requires all visitors to check in and obtain appropriate identification.
- c. Install and maintain security cameras throughout the school premises, including entrances, hallways, and common areas.
- d. Ensure all entry points are secured with controlled access systems, such as locked doors with key cards or buzz-in systems.
- e. Enhance communication systems within the school, including emergency alert systems, intercoms, and reliable communication channels for staff members.
- f. Consider installation of metal detectors or other screening measures at entrances to detect and deter potential weapons.



Threat Assessment and Mental Health Resources and Supports

POND

- a. Provide ongoing training for teachers and staff on recognizing and addressing potential threats, including identifying signs of stress in students.
- b. Provide student trainings on personal safety, conflict resolution, violence prevention, and recognizing potential dangers within and outside of school.
- c. Create a culture of inclusivity and support within the school to help students feel connected and less likely to resort to violence; student-to-student and trusted adults; i.e. encourage peer-lead groups and support clubs to promote positive relationships and reduce social isolation, anonymous reporting systems for threats and online cyberbullying.
- d. Implement robust mental health support systems that include counseling services and access to qualified professionals for students needs.
- e. Foster strong community partnerships with organizations and agencies to provide additional resources and support




Mission


2022

- HR 208 requests public school principals to conduct quarterly drills for active shooter
 - HR 218 requests a Study on school safety & security issues by LDOE
 - HR 236 creates a **Special Study Committee** within the House of Representatives


	 <u>HB 78 (Hughes)</u>: School facilities preservation, Capital Improvement Fund, and System-wide needs program
	• <u>HB 86 (Hodges)</u> : Protect Teachers Act ; civil liability
2023	•HB 242 (Hilferty): prohibits Corporal punishment without parental consent
	• <u>HB 289 (Ivey)</u> : Organ donor curriculum
	• <u>HB 169 (Owen)</u> : Safety policy for K-5 carpool and bus lines.
2023	•Vehicles to come to a complete stop & student remains restrained or at a safe distance
2025	 Student in grades K-5 be accompanied by a school employee.
	•Employees wear traffic vests
	 <u>SB12 (Fields)</u>: AEDs / Jumpstart Your Heart Fund
	 require AED at each elementary, middle, and high school; and at athletic events;
2023	 require an individual trained to use the AED and first-aid CPR at the events
	 require a cardiac emergency response plan





2022 Reported School Threats

• LA SAFE Fusion Center received 109 threats to school safety in 2022.




These statistics are by calendar year, not school year.





2022 Reported School Threats

 Majority of threats were made by students (44), while (32) were spoof/hoax calls. Shootings and bomb threats made up the majority of calls received.







2022 Reported School Threats

 Students making school threats primarily used social media via Instagram and Snapchat. School shooting threats were reported in the form of call-ins and social media, whereas most bomb threats were reported strictly by call-instagram



RAVE Panic Button

POND

- <u>Rave Panic Button</u> accelerates emergency response.
- The App is free to all K-12; public, private, and charter schools as a coordination and communication resource for administrators, faculty, and staff; <u>not students</u>.
- Places a 911 call while sending an In-App notification, Text message, and Email allowing school employees to become immediate responders.

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



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
Anonymous Reporting

- Louisiana Center for Safe Schools staffing (11 positions)






Louisiana School Safety: Path Forward
